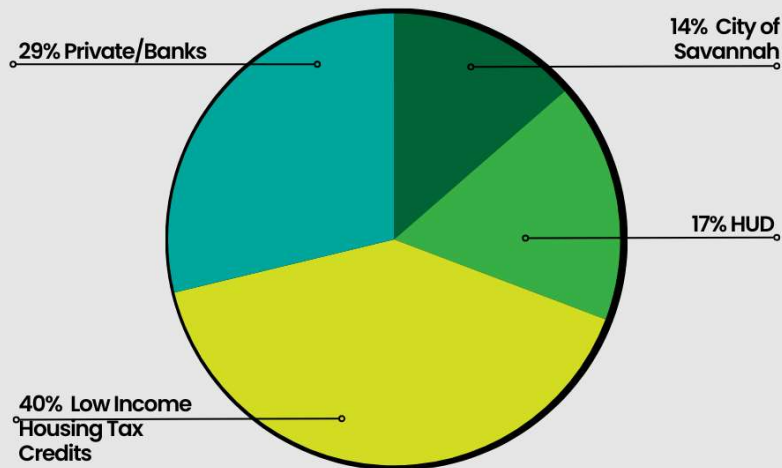

\$40M drainage improvements in midtown Savannah!

Many of the major projects undertaken by CHSA were preceded by significant drainage improvements by the City of Savannah. These infrastructure improvements literally pave the way toward improved housing opportunities throughout Savannah!

Not Blight, but "Systemic Vacancy"

The Center for Community Progress outlined some reasons why the term, "blight," may not be the best way to describe vacant, abandoned, deteriorated buildings. Preferable: systemic vacancy. "Blight implies it is random and blameless," but often it's the "consequence of a legacy of intentional disinvestment, poverty, unjust policies, and racist systems."
